Federal Post Office Buildings Documented by Congress

50TH CONGRESS, | HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. REPORT No. 1134. 1st Session.

PUBLIC BUILDING AT PUEBLO, COLO.

MARCH 13, 1888.—Committed to the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union and ordered to be printed.

Mr. BANKHEAD, from the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany bill H. R. 1264.]

The Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 1264) for the erection of a public building at Pueblo, Colo., respectfully report:

The city of Pueblo, State of Colorado, is a large and rapidly-growing town, with a population of over 20,000. It is the leading commercial and manufacturing town in the State, with the exception of the city of Denver; is the largest manufacturing town on the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains and west of the Missouri River.

The business of the Pueblo land office is among the largest in the country. The business of this office has increased over 300 per cent. since 1885, and the business for the last year approximated \$200,000. The continual large increase of this business is assured, as not 20 per cent. of the land in the district is yet taken up. The district embraces over 10,000,000 acres. The records of this land office are very voluminous and exceedingly valuable. It would take an immense amount of money to replace them if destroyed.

The post-office at Pueblo is a very large and important office. It is

Pueblo, CO, also relatively small, was argued in 1888 to be an important distribution center with immense mineral wealth flowing through the office as the railroads arrived ("The Missouri Pacific system has made its terminus there during the past summer.") The ornate 'Venetian' building was authorized in 1891 and completed in 1898.

1898 Pueblo, Colorado post office (see post card on page 1): By examining government records, a deltiologist can match a post card's image of a post office with the official narrative that supplies historical details, such as the building's authorization and designer.

RMPL Elections Scheduled for January

With this issue of *Scribblings*, we kick off the campaign for new officers for the 2015-18 RMPL board.

We've attempted to make the election process as simple as possible for members to run for office and be elected (see the May through December issues of Scribblings for 2011).

Details of the RMPL election process may be found in the bylaws, printed in the January 2011 issue of *Scribblings*. To find the issue, go to our webpage at rmpldenver.org and click on Publications in the menu on the left.

Ten board positions are filled through the election, which for the first time will be run by Brian Kraemer, as Roger Rydberg has decided to step down after doing the job for the past six elections.

The election is important in several regards.

First, all members are welcome to run for office and provide new insight into the operations of the RMPL.

Board members have to be prepared to attend meetings five times a year, and to review library related emails numerous times during the year.

Second, all of you possess the capacity to contribute because of your preexisting passion for stamp collecting, but what you really need is the capacity to recognize that you may have to expand your views to accommodate the larger perspective resulting in an organization of 530 individuals (and growing) with as forceful, and varied, views as your own

Third, we try to get all members of the board working on facets of the library's administration. In doing so, your hourly commitment can be anywhere from as little as a couple of hours per month to as many as you believe are needed for the tasks at hand. You should recognize that the library has grown from a solely Colorado focused undertaking to a nationally and internationally recognized institution.

We do not have term limits, and frankly, the absence of such limits makes it difficult for transitions to allow younger members to take over and operate the RMPL.

But there has been some movement in that direction as a result of the election two years ago, and this helps provide a means to take the RMPL further into the 21st century and its technological marvels.

I urge all of you to consider that the needs of the RMPL will probably be considerably different a decade down the road than those addressed by the founding generation over the past two decades.

For my part, as part of that founding generation,

A chemist's warning ...

WD-40 to Remove Self Adhesives: Don't Use It

WD-40 is a good lubricant and penetrant, no argument there. But its use in other forums, such as recently suggested

on the internet and in the philatelic press, should not be encouraged.

In other words, it should *not* be used to remove stamps from paper.

The Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS) gives some insight for the solvent.

Its formula is a trade secret, but it is composed of a mixture of volatile hydrocarbons (HCs) and a light-weight oil. HCs, chemists learned years ago, is anathema for stamps, and its destructiveness to paper cannot be overstated.



WD-40 may work when removing self adhesive postage stamps from paper, but the author says it's a bad idea for the stamps.

The dangers of its use may result in:

- staining
- · bleeding inks
- corruption of the paper's fibers

There are two other important reasons the mixture of HCs should not be used to remove stamps from paper.

First, it is an organic solvent that will leave behind a sticky residue. This residue will likely ruin the stamp over time. It is not worth the risk.

Second, and more importantly, it should *not* be used by children. In fact, they should never be anywhere near WD-40. This is because it is volatile and flammable, and its vapors will irritate eyes and lungs.

If you have questions about this information, I suggest you go to the internet and study the pros and cons of WD-40.

Size Matters...really...

The illustrated stamps may really be the scarce Scott # 315 used and the very scarce # 534B used, but they will likely never be certified as such. They just aren't big enough.

The imperforate versions of some stamps are considerably scarcer and commensurately more expensive than the perforated ones.

The two illustrations show examples. Scott #315 is the imperforate version of #304, and the 534B is the imperforate version of 528B, the Type VII offset 2¢ stamp. Other examples include Scott numbers #482A and the *rare* imperforate #314A versions of Scott #500 and #303. One seldom encounters these last two.#314A is known only with Shermack Type III perforations. The rarity of the genuine article demands an authenticity certificate from a first tier authenticating agency, and these are typically offered with such a certificate.



There is no way to tell if these two items have been cut close from an imperforate sheet or trimmed from perforated stamps. If the first, they are considerably scarcer and more valuable. They are not quite tall enough to fit the criteria of size.

On the other hand, the two illustrated are fairly frequently seen. Both the Scott #304 and the #528B are relatively common and inexpensive, especially used. A wide-margined perforated stamp can easily be trimmed to appear to be the imperforate variety. (Of course, original imperforate sheets may have been cut small by the original user. One never knows if there are no traces of perforations under magnification around the edges.)

The rule of thumb in examining flat plate coil stamps is 25mm high or 21.5 mm wide with no trace of perforation. Some genuine coils will vary from this, but it is a good rule of thumb. The same rule may be applied to imperforate stamps which have greater value than their perforated counterparts- and prudence does call for looking around the edges for perforation traces. Of course, multiples speak for themselves; and, as always, seek these out from a trusted source.

PERIODICAL PICKIN'S

The Eesti Philatelist

Now here's a new approach; writing about a journal that is completely unfathomable to me.

Why? Because the RMPL's periodical holdings contain journals and periodicals from nations outside of the English speaking world written in native languages.

Yes, sir, there is a world of stamp collectors beyond the United States. In fact, virtually every nation on earth with a postage stamp program has a means of publicizing its stamps, whether it be by governmental publications or within the marketplace by private journals.

In the case of RMPL's holdings, I'd conservatively estimate that we have in the range of 100 or so foreign language publications. This is the first *Periodical Pickin's* I've ever devoted to the subject. Most certainly, I could have picked easier journals written in Spanish, or for that matter, Chinese!

But no, I instead will focus on The Eesti Philatelist, otherwise known as The Estonian Philatelist or, in German, Der Estnische Philatelist, or, in Estonian, Eesti Filateelisti.

For the most part, the runs of our foreign language journals tend to be thin, but in this case it spans the years 1972 to 1996.

The magazines have wound up in our library because of the generous donations of specialists in the philately of the nations covered by those foreign language journals, and, for this, we thank them profusely.

But, the fact remains, very few of them are perused by library patrons because of the sometimes insurmountable problems of language.

In this case, the journal originates in Sweden, and is published in three languages. I discovered the English translations of articles as either summaries or full length pieces, so the insurmountable problem turned out to be slightly inconsequential. And, by the way, the journal is still published today.

But here's where a picture is sometimes worth a thousand words. In this case, the Eesti Philatelist appears to be published on a once a year basis. In consequence, it is a somewhat thick journal. The example I scanned was volume 36 (the publication began in 1955) consisting of

more than 260 pages.

The first noticeable attribute in the journal was the total lack of advertising. Hooray. Next was the fine print. This is

not a journal for folks who like to read only 12 point type. Most of it appeared to be 8 or 9 point New Roman font. At least through 1996, the journals were in black and white, but the webpage for the society shows the more recent issues have color.

There are pictures and illustrations of documents, stamps, covers, and related material. In fact, I would say about a

dictionary!



third of the journal is devoted to such illustrations.

The intermingling of Estonian, English and German in the articles and the descriptions of materials allows for a

broad base of understanding of the various subjects.

Regrettably, I found the journal doesn't provide details in English for every article, but there's always the corner drugstore where you can probably find an Estonian

Cancellations, postmarks, and statistics of every kind proliferate throughout the pages, probably providing specialists and non-specialists alike a treasure trove of comparative material for Estonia.

In conclusion, while one might struggle with Chinese, Japanese, or Estonian, there is yet another saving grace about the journal. The Society webpage has articles presented in good English.

Should you experience any difficulty wending your way through The Eesti Philatelist, turn your attention to the internet for more resources as you pursue the philately of this Baltic state.
