The Late 19th Century Transition in Stamp Collecting as Shown by a Study of Scott International Stamp Albums




Fig. 1. Tenth edition of the Scott International Postage Stamp Album

As historical and cultural artifacts, stamp albums cannot be logically separated from stamp catalogues and philatelic literature, yet philatelic libraries seem to neglect stamp albums entirely. For example, although the RMPL has a date run of Scott catalogues from 1894 to date and examples of Stanley Gibbons catalogues starting from 1897, no corresponding stamp albums are in the collection. A somewhat similar situation appears to be the case at the American Philatelic Research Library.

Since I am fascinated by the history of stamp collecting, this necessarily includes the study of early pre-printed stamp albums that reveal the full range and scope of stamp collecting at various times. In pursuing this interest, I have acquired examples of stamp albums from different eras and have found that a study of various 19th century editions of *The Scott International Postage Stamp Album* can be especially illuminating. An example obtained from RMPL's 2012 Large Lot Auction (without stamps) is shown in Figure 1.

The cover of this Tenth Edition album shows schoolboys displaying banners with different nations' coats of arms and highlights 3,000 engravings illustrating different stamps. This slim volume is a complete worldwide album

with spaces for all known stamps to date including world-wide envelopes (cut squares) and wrappers. The United States section includes revenues, telegraph and local stamps. The album is in two parts with separate title pages. The first part is a full worldwide album with an 1891 copyright date; the second is a supplement dated 1893. This low-cost stamp album was the standard type for stamp collectors and sold for \$1.50 postpaid. It has double-sided pages bound in boards with half cloth as shown. Fancier versions with cloth bindings to full morocco leather with gilding and single sided pages were offered at prices ranging from \$2.50-\$26. Again, it should be pointed out that this was an album designed for the general stamp collector.

After detailed examination, some example sections from these pages are shown in Figure 2. This scope of coverage would likely give any modern collector a severe case

of vertigo. The top row includes the famed "post office" Mauritius stamps of 1847. The second row shows spaces for 10-centavo envelope cut squares of Ecuador from 1887 on four different colors of paper. The third row of U.S. locals includes Wells, Fargo & Co. pony express stamps to \$4 and the bottom row of postmaster provisionals has spaces for seven varieties of the St. Louis bears!

It seems that at the beginning of the 1890s, the problem was that there were not enough stamps to collect. This resulted in the inclusion of worldwide envelopes, U. S. telegraph and local stamps, etc. It is, perhaps, the most comprehensive single-volume stamp album ever produced.

However, by the turn of the century, there was an explosion of new issues designed with the stamp collector in mind. This resulted in corresponding changes to both stamp albums and catalogues. Among these new issues were commemorative postage stamps such as the U. S. Columbian and Canadian Jubilee issues, as well as yearly sets of Seebeck stamps for Honduras, Nicaragua and El Salvador, each of which were lengthy series to high values. To accommodate these by 1901, worldwide envelopes and U. S. locals were dropped from *Scott International Postage Stamp Albums* and coverage of other minor items was significantly reduced.




Fig. 3. Scott's Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue for 1897.

The transition in stamp collecting that began between the early 1890s and the turn of the century is also reflected in *Scott's Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue*. For example, while the 1897 version at RMPL (Fig. 3) includes comprehensive listings of the worldwide envelopes and

(Continued from page 3) wrappers, these listings were dropped beginning in the 1904 issue.

Because of the complexity of providing detailed analysis of a series of different versions of stamp albums, only a brief overview of salient points for the 1891, 1899 and 1901 editions in my collection is given here. This information has been cross-checked against the much more comprehensive collection of Scott International Postage Stamp Albums in Dr. Larry Parks' magnificent philatelic library beginning with the first edition of this album published in 1875. This collection also includes the seventh (1881) and eighth (1884) editions, plus later editions published in 1891, 1894, 1900 and 1901. He also has a complete run of Scott Standard Postage Stamp Catalogues spanning this period.

Comparison with earlier versions of the *Scott International*Postage Stamp Album suggests that

the 1891 version offers the most complete coverage. For example, that volume has spaces for the "post office" Mauritius stamps, St. Louis bears, and other stamps that do not appear in the earlier editions examined. For all its completeness, the 1891 album is nonetheless a slim volume offering spaces for every major variety of postage stamp known to that time, including all of the world's envelope stamps (cut squares). The U. S. stamps begin with postmaster provisionals and the 1847 issues (current Scott 1 and 2) follow on the 3rd line of the second page. Spaces are included for all revenue and postmaster provisional stamps (with seven spaces for St. Louis bears), 13 pages for local stamps, plus three pages for telegraph stamps, etc. The measured thickness of all these double-sided pages together is only about 15.5 mm.

Both the 1899 and 1891 editions include spaces for the world's envelope stamps as cut squares. However, the U. S. section of the 1899 volume now starts with the 1847 issues and there is reduced coverage of postmaster provisionals on a single page with three spaces for St. Louis bears. Locals are no longer listed, but there are 1½ pages for carrier stamps and coverage of telegraph stamps has expanded to five pages. Measured thickness of these double-sided pages is now about 26 mm, showing the substantial increase in the number of issues during the 1890s.

By the 1901 edition, the *Scott International* album had dropped worldwide coverage of envelope stamps with the U. S. coverage remaining essentially the same as in the 1899 edition. With a measured thickness of its double-sided pages at little over 30 mm, this edition demonstrates the benefit of dropping worldwide coverage of envelope stamps to accommodate the worldwide increase in adhesive postage stamps, allowing the stamp album to remain




Fig. 4. The Scott International Postage Stamp Album - 1901 edition

as a single volume offering comprehensive worldwide coverage. The 1901 edition, now "illustrated with 4,000 engravings" is shown in Figure 4. This example from my collection is copyrighted 1900 and is apparently the immediate precursor of Scott's 19th Century stamp album with its copyright date of 1902.

The "take away" from this analysis is that the decade of the 1890s was a transformative one for general stamp collecting in the United States, resulting in a marked change in collecting interests. In 1891, for example, worldwide envelope cut squares were apparently widely collected, but after the turn of the century these were no longer included either in the Scott International Albums or the Scott Postage Stamp Catalogues. Coupled with the explosion of new issues during the 1890s, general collectors in the United States clearly shifted their worldwide collecting interests to adhe-

sive postage stamps only, a change essentially driven by the disappearance of spaces for worldwide envelope cut squares in their pre-printed stamp albums and their corresponding elimination from Scott stamp catalogues.




Fig. 5. The first two (of four) slim volumes of the Stanley Gibbons catalogue for 1899

A similar transition seems to have occurred in Great Britain at the turn of the century. For example by the 1899 edition, the *Stanley Gibbons Priced Catalogue* had split into four slim volumes. These separately listed British Empire stamps, foreign stamps, worldwide local stamps, and envelopes and post cards. I'm fortunate in having the first two of these, shown in Figure 5. The 1900 edition was the last one issued that covered worldwide envelopes.

WORK TOWARDS A CURE FOR HISTORICAL AMNESIA

A friend and I share a love for history and a passion for stamp collecting. He took a Mississippi River cruise that stopped at Civil War battlefields. During a question/ answer session, a tourist asked the National Park Ranger, "Why were so many Civil War battles fought in National Parks?"

This questioner suffers from a cultural malady: historical amnesia, a forgetfulness of what the past teaches us. In his recent book, *The American Spirit*, (Simon & Schuster, 2017), historian

David McCullough shares a collection of speeches on why history inspires readers. "We are raising a generation of young Americans who are by and large historically illiterate," he laments.

In his latest book, McCullough tells of meeting a Missouri college student who was grateful for his campus lecture. "Until now I never understood that the original 13 colonies were all on the East Coast," she declared. Struck by historical amnesia, another student asked McCullough, biographer of presidents, "Aside from Harry Truman (1884-1972) and John Adams (1735-1826), how many other presidents have you interviewed?"

Lack of historical imagination and gullibility to factual inaccuracies afflicts many citizens. We have forgotten formative principles that shaped our nation's founding. Thomas Jefferson fed his mind by using ample time for

reading history. After practicing law, he later in life advised law students to set aside time in each day to concentrate on history. "... from noon to 1:00 p.m., politics," he wrote, "with the balance of the afternoon devoted to history, ancient through modern..." (Jefferson: Architect of American Liberty, John B. Boles, Basic Books, p. 20, 2017).

Learning from history saves us from living narrow lives confined to contemporary moments. Learn from past mistakes. Be inspired by achievements that occurred long ago. Jefferson realized that "to remember" is a dominant biblical theme. "Remember the days of old. Consider the years of many generations. Ask your father, and he will show you; your elders, and they will tell you." (Deuteronomy 32:7).

Historian McCullough is sold on a good story's effect on listeners. He improvises on E. M. Forster's observation: "If I say to you the king died and then the queen died, that's a sequence of events. If I say the king died and the queen died of grief, that's a story." I have found this to be good advice. In period costume, I visit classrooms dressed as Thomas Jefferson, teaching history through stories.

I put on my Jefferson colonial costume for the first time during our Bicentennial in 1976 when I lived near Philadelphia. Years later, I mentioned "bicentennial" to some Colorado students to whom I presented Jefferson. Some of these high schoolers looked blankly at the word "bicentennial" which appeared in the hand-out materials and gave wrong answers to this word's meaning. Then a student's hand shot up. "Is it connected with the University of Colorado's athletic mascot?" he asked, proudly knowing that "another name for buffalo is bison." Maybe a "bicentennial" is part of a clever pep rally phrase?

Skipping historical study arouses needless arguments. This past 4th of July, National Public Radio repeated a 29-year on-air tradition. It tweeted the Declaration of Independence line by line. Jefferson wrote how dictator King George III had robbed colonials of their God-given rights. "He [King George III] has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers," reads the Declaration.

Then Jefferson wrote, "A Prince [referring to King George III] whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people." Some Twitter users chastised NPR, accusing this radio network of pushing a political agenda that slams our current president. Other listeners stumbled into an historical dark hole. They confused the Declaration's King George III with today's occupant of the White House.

We desperately need the perspective that history provides. As Winston Churchill declared, "The longer you look back, the farther you can see forward," except when historical amnesia sets in, blinding us to how historical moments influence what's happening today and tomorrow.

For those of us in the philatelic world, we know that an excellent way to reduce historical amnesia is by using stamps as an approachable and interesting educational tool.

Mid-Year 2017 RMPL Financial Report

The Board of Directors of the RMPL are presenting the following financial results thus far in 2017. During the first half of 2017, the total income of the RMPL was \$49,301 compared with the first half of 2016 income of \$61,678. The principle sources of income during this period in 2017 were auction sales of \$23,406, membership dues and donations of \$14,638, and stamp and publications sales of \$6,431.

Total expenses for the first six months of 2017 were \$38,010, compared with total expenses for 2016 of \$23,586. The largest increase in expenses was the addition of property taxes paid to Arapahoe County. (See below for explanation.) Besides property taxes, the largest category of expenses was Recurring Building expenses (heat, light, water, etc.) of \$9,552. Other major expenses were Operations (office expenses, etc.) of \$2,967 and Technology (computers, copiers, etc.) of \$7,956.

Before 2016, the RMPL, as a charitable organization, obtained an exemption from the property taxes imposed by Arapahoe County. During early 2016, this exemption was not renewed. Therefore, property taxes of \$14,718 for 2016 were assessed the RMPL. These taxes became due during early 2017. The RMPL Board of Directors has applied for the property tax exemption to be reinstated. The decision by the County Commissioners on this matter is to be made

in October, 2017.

During the first half of 2017, the excess of income over expenses (profit) was \$11,291 compared to \$38,092 for the same period in 2016. During May 2017, \$25,000 was deposited into the Library Trust Fund held by UBS. Also furniture and equipment of \$3,192 was purchased. The Spring Auction at the RMSS which occurred in May will not reoccur during the last six months of this year.

Detailed financial reports will be posted in the glass case in the entryway of RMPL. It is planned that the financial data for the year 2017 will be posted in January, 2018. Questions can be addressed to Timothy Heins, Treasurer at rmpl@qwestoffice.net.

The CPA firm of Taylor, Roth and Associates has prepared the IRS form "Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax" for 2016. This form was accepted by the IRS. Copies of this form are available for inspection at the RMPL.

Book Review

U.S. Railroad Contract Mail Routes (1832-1875)

By Russell Powers

U.S. Railroad Contract Mail Routes (1832-1875) by Hugh V. Carrying the mails was a major source of revenue that helped support passenger rail service in this country. In later years this was especially true for secondary and branch line trains. It is no coincidence that the decline and discontinuance of these trains in the 1960s was due to the Post Office switching mail contracts to trucks and airlines.

This well-written and researched tome is clearly the definitive gold standard for the subject of early-day rail-way contract mail routes. Its main use appears to be that of a reference book. It is well organized, easy to read, and the information being sought by a user is easily found.

Introductory chapters include: (1) the introduction of railroads in the US and the carriage of mail, (2) a chronologic listing, by state, of the growth of railroad mail contracts, (3) mail contract terms, (4) payment terms, (5) route agents and mail messengers, (6) railway post offices, and (7) biographies of railroad tycoons.


Mail contracts are grouped by state. Most entries provide a history of the rail route as well as a history of the mail contract for that route. Many route descriptions include a map of the route, listing of stations and their changes over time, and for many listings, a timetable from a period Appleton's Guide shows the schedule of the mail train. Many entries also have pictures of covers. For most

short line contracts, however, only a very short narrative is provided, especially for those in the Pennsylvania coal mining regions. Not all railroad lines of this time period carried mail, so this book just covers railway routes that did have mail contracts.

Colorado does not appear in the contract lists, although two railroads, the Colorado Central and the Denver & Rio Grande carried mail ("carded mail trains") by 1870 and 1871 respectively. The listings also exclude the Confederate States' rail postal operations, probably a subject by itself. These omissions do not detract from the quality and usefulness of this book.

There is an appended DVD that contains images of over 800 covers, Postmaster Generals' annual reports plus other reports to Congress (1817-1878). It also includes images of the manuscripts of railroad contracts grouped by state, additional maps, etc. The author suggests that many or all of these items have not been reproduced until now. The DVD contains close to 10,000 pages.
