Is It or Isn't It? - A \$70,000 Stamp!!! (??)

The range of services supplied by your *Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library* probably isn't too well known to many of the members. Most individuals think of it only as a resource for catalogs, periodicals, or handbooks detailing some specialized phase of philately and unquestionably this constitutes the major use. We do appraisals, mentoring, sorting and cataloguing, but how many are aware that we do expertizing of stamps, at least on a limited basis. There are no experts like Herbert Bloch, Pat Herst, or Jacques Schiff available to the members, but there are individuals that are extremely knowledgeable in many philatelic areas.

Recently, a member of the RMPL asked us to "expertize" a stamp for a friend of his. The friend, claiming to be an accomplished philatelist, thought it might be a US Scott 596, which is perforated 11 X 11 and is a <u>rotary</u> printing. This one-cent green stamp of the 1922 Series (aka 4th Bureau issues) is one of the

rarest of the US stamps and catalogs \$70,000.

When asked to "expertize" the stamp, we considered it a great honor to even be considered. After all, only about 12 stamps of this catalog number have ever been found, so when our local "expert" agreed to look at it, he immediately went to the RMPL stacks and began searching for information to use in confirming the characteristics of the stamp.

Being a US stamp, he turned first to the publications of The United States Stamp Society, known for decades as the Bureau Issues Association. Sure enough, there were two well-written articles that would be a

great help.



By the time the actual stamp arrived from Maryland, our "expert', being the excitable type, could hardly contain himself. Let's remember all the characteristics: Green, actually a grayish green, not yellow green; Rotary printing, not flat plate; size of design 19 1/4 X 22 1/2 mm.; perforated 11 X 11; Kiusalas measurements should be 11-72 around (if you don't know what this means, look it up in the US Specialist Index); known with old style KANSAS CITY, MO precancel or else no precancel; only known used, not mint.

Using the RMPL binocular microscope with 7-45 power magnification, and with the PHIL-A-METER gauge with 1/4 mm distances ready, the Kiusalas gauge on the microscope platen, our "expert" gingerly slipped the tongs into the envelope to remove the alleged

\$70,000 stamp. What's this – a local Union Bridge, MD local precancel on the stamp? Humph! Never known before with this precancel, but why not. All things are possible. The green color doesn't really have the grayish green cast. Must be the overhead fluorescent lights. Laying the millimeter gauge over the design under the microscope, it does indeed measure very close to 19 1/4 mm X 22 1/2 mm. Whoa!! Could it be? This is a rotary stamp, not flat plate. Let's measure the perfs using the Kiusalas gauge to see if it has been counterfeited. Hey, this doesn't measure 11-72, it measures 11-70. Something is not right. Check it again. Yep, it's 11-70. Well, what about the vertical perfs? They should be 11-72. Son of a gun, they aren't even perf. 11. They are 10 1/2 -75. This means that instead of being an 11 X 11 perf stamp, this thing is only an 11 X 10 1/2 perf stamp which is worth it's weight in waste paper. A cheap, common stamp of the twenties and thirties! Why did this fellow think he had an 11 X 11 rotary press expensive stamp. Who knows? Bah

Humbug!!

What a disappointment! Guess he better cancel the contract for the new Lexus SUV!
