# Cuba Libre! - Stamps of the War of Independence

Had the postage stamp been invented 100-years earlier, in 1740 for example, instead of 1840, would U.S. Postal History begin with the British Colonies? Suppose, also, that Ben Franklin (Scott C150), Tom Paine, George Washington (Scott 2556-7), Thomas Jefferson and Sam Adams had issued "insurrection" stamps to help pay for the cost of the war. Mail would have been carried behind the lines and in rebel controlled territory, from Georgia to Vermont and through Virginia and Pennsylvania and New York. And there were letters from Europe coming in all the time to the revolutionists.

So, the moot question would be for potential collectors, would you begin your U.S. collection with the British Colonies, or the "insurrection stamps", or only with the "official stamps" issued by the Republic after

Postal Service was established.

This leads to the subject of collecting Cuban stamps and the postal history of Cuba. Traditionally, many collectors begin with the Spanish issues throughout the 19th century. However the Cuban insurrectionists issued stamps as early as 1874, many years before the Republic of Cuba was formed in 1902.

Later also, and beside the point, was the period of U.S. intervention, also before the Republic was formed. My personal preference is to begin the postal history of the Republic of Cuba with the "insurrectos" of 1874

and the later issues of 1896. These are the subject of this article.

Cuba waged a ten-year war against the Spanish from 1868 to 1878. The Treaty of Zanjón ended the fighting that year. The Spanish believed they had crushed the insurrection, but for the Cuban leadership it was only a "truce". The war erupted again in 1895 and continued until the U.S. intervention in 1898.

The 1874 stamp (Correo Insurrecto, Edifil #1; Guerra #59) was authorized by the General Revolutionary Junta, and was engraved and printed by the Continental Bank Note Company (New York?). Continental later was acquired by American Bank Note

Company. This stamp is usually identified as printed by ABN.

Earlier, Cuban writer, publisher and teacher, Jose Antonio Saco (Scott 271, 279, 526) wrote an important paper titled "Parallel Between the Island of Cuba and Several English Colonies" as well as "The History of Slavery" both documents providing inspiration for the movement for independence from Spain and emancipation of slaves in Cuba, and the beginning of the ten-year war.

Another early inspiration to the revolution was the writings of poet, José María de Heredia (Scott C34 C35) imprisoned and exiled by the Spanish in 1823, later living in exile in Boston, New York and Philadelphia, and dying in Mexico in 1839. One of his

most famous poems is *Oda al Niágara*, written during a visit to Niagara Falls and illustrated on Scott C35. On October 10, 1868, at the Yara Plantation in Oriente Province, a group of men declared Cuba independent of Spain. The Grito de Yara, became the equivalent of our Declaration of Independence. The revolution that began with only 147 men at Yara, had reached 26,000 by the end of the year. After signing the

revolutionary document they next freed the slaves.
Ignacio Agramonte (Scott 269, 277, 524, 3380, 3712) drafted and signed the original Constitution of 1869

and the Emancipation Act the same year.

Carlos Manuel de Céspedes, (Scott 273, 528, 1871, 3709) considered to be the "Father of his Country", was unanimously chosen at Yara on October 10, 1868, to be the first Provisional President of the new Republic. The Mambí, as the guerilla army was called, was opposed by two important elements, the Spanish government and army known as the Peninsulars, the other group, formed by the Spanish, from Cuban supporters assigned to home guard in the cities and as a powerful spy organization, called the Voluntarios. The Voluntarios, composed only of white males , reported on subversive activities, appealed to racial prejudice, and demanded loyalty to Spain.

Thank you to each and every one. Unfortunately some material just seems to show up and we do not know who donated it. We thank those anonymous donors, also.

In 1869 President Céspedes, at the invitation of the Spanish, sent an envoy, Agustín Arango, under safe conduct, to meet with the Spanish at Puerto Principe (now Camaguey). The Voluntarios, refusing to honor the safe conduct, murdered Arango along the way and the meeting never took place. Spain then tried to get the United States to intervene toward discussing terms of peace. The US declined to take part. The Spanish minister in Washington then sent a representative, Juan Clemente Zenea, under safe conduct to Cuba to travel freely to discuss peace terms and disband the Voluntarios. He was captured in Havana by the Voluntarios, imprisoned in defiance of Spanish orders, and then executed. These actions caused thousands more Cubans to join the army of Cuba Libre and the new Republic.

In 1871 a group of students were accused of making derogatory remarks about the Voluntarios and 43 of them were arrested and tried but all were acquitted. A new trial was forced and all were convicted this time, eight were shot, the rest imprisoned at hard labor. (Scott 490-97, 1657) There is a monument today in Havana

dedicated to the memory of the eight medical students.

President Céspedes later resigned over differences with political enemies within the revolution, and retired to his farm at San Larenzo in January 1874. Within a month, a force of over 1000 Spainards captured and

killed him, undefended as he was, on his farm.

By this time, Vicente Mora Pera (Scott 1693) had been appointed Director de Correos de Cuba en Armas (Cuba Postal Director) and steps were taken to organize postal service throughout the island, and to print and distribute a new stamp to raise money internally as well as to publicize the new Republic among friends and sympathizers in the US and overseas. Postal service now extended throughout the eastern 3/4 of the island from Santiago de Cuba to Colon.

The new stamp, with a value of 10 centavos, featured the shield of the coat-of-arms, with the sun rising over a key, the link commanding the entrance to the Gulf of Mexico. At lower left are the stripes from the flag and at lower right a mountain scene with a Royal Palm, the national tree. 100,000 copies were printed by the

Continental Bank Note Company.
