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A Eureka & Scotia R.P.O. Cover...

A Lonesome Little Piece of Railroad

This is the story of a railroad post office that served a dozen or so communities along a 35-mile route between Eureka and the logging town of Scotia in Northern

California.

It wasn't connected to any other railroad of significance. In fact, there was no rail connection from Northern California to the outside world until 1914.

To give a better idea of where the R.P.O. ran, Eureka is 275 miles north of San Francisco near the Pacific Ocean, and Scotia is 35 miles to the southwest of Sureka.

The cover shown is from the Eel River and Eureka R.R. to the Pacific Lumber Company. The E.R.&E. built the tracks for the first 28 miles to Scotia and Pacific Lumber built and owned the last 7 miles. Pacific also ran a lumber mill in Scotia, so the two companies had plenty of reasons to correspond with each other.

The ER&E was finished to within a mile of Hydesville (see map) in November of 1884 but it was more than

four years later when the Eureka and Hydesville R.P.O. was established.

The R.P.O. only ran as far as Hydesville until the summer of 1895 despite the fact that the railroad began service all the way to Scotia ten years earlier. Finally, on June 17, 1895, the R.P.O. was extended to Scotia, and the R.P.O. was renamed the Eureka and Scotia.


One reason the circular date stamp on the cover shown was so sharp may be because the device was less than two months old when the cds was struck.

A 1901 timetable shows it took an hour and 55 minutes to travel from Scotia to Eureka and an hour and 40 minutes to go from Eureka to Scotia.

The same timetable shows how the mail got to Eureka and Northern California from the outside world. Two steamships made the trip from San Francisco every five days, so there were at least two mail deliveries a week.

While there isn't much difference in elevation along the route, it wasn't at all easy to put down the main line. A tunnel, in particular, took extra effort.

This was, and still is, logging country. Before the railroad, it was a tough pull for wagons to haul wood from the cutting areas all the way to Eureka on dirt roads.




An early cancellation from the Eureka & Scotia R.P.O. Service had begun just 53 days earlier, on June 17, 1898. Coincidentally, that was the same day the 2¢ stamp from the Trans-Mississippi series was issued.



By 1911 the railroad had extended tracks north from Eureka a few miles to Arcata and south from Scotia to Elinor and the R.P.O. was renamed again, this time to the Arcata and Elinor.

On a personal note, from time to time when I have given tours of the library to visitors, I have been asked why the RMPL has a room dedicated to western history and railroads. The reason is that communications played a very large

AUCTION WATCH

"Storage for our Keepsakes"

At the local CHERPEX stamp show a couple of years ago, the Cherelyn table chairman was befuddled as to what to do with a couple of dozen stamp boxes the club had acquired a decade earlier for use as door prizes at meetings. Unfortunately, they were just taking up space, so we decided to price them for quick sale.

We were amazed when several show attendees "snarfed" them up as quickly as they laid their eyes on them. They couldn't write out the checks fast enough!

We realized right away we had dramatically underpriced them, but nonetheless asked one lady why

she had bought them so hurriedly.

She said she went to stamp shows with her husband ir Europe and was attracted to the ornateness of stamp boxes. So she sought them out while her husband looked for stamps. She said they were fairly expensive in Europe, and found our prices irresistible. She walked away with a baker's dozen.

That incident came to mind as I was recently going through a Cavendish auction catalog which included 17 lots of boxes. I recalled that I had created a listing in our auction database under the caption "Postage Stamp Boxes."

My project for indexing the RMPL's auction catalogs is only up to "C". But out of the 18-hundred I've indexed, three included stamp boxes. The Boule (France) auction #55 of December 4, 1998; the Cavendish (England) auction #568 of September 30, 1999, and the Chritstie's Robson Lowe #4603 of September 17, 1991.

Stamp boxes are an unusual, ancillary aspect of the hobby. The first ones were simple places to store stamps. But by the late 1800s they evolved into elaborate, intricate, fanciful, artistic affairs.

The Christie's Robson Lowe auction listed 21 lots, with valuations from 50 pounds to 120 pounds. Some were created in the form of envelopes, (a particularly attractive one featured the embossed head of King Edward VIII), and another was spring loaded with leather compartments.

Boule's auction listed 17 lots. All were metal, finely engraved and detailed. Valuations ranged from 500 to 1200 francs.
