# USPS Gold Crate Denver Mint Connection

It was an unusual retirement gift, to say the least, and it was just what Dr. Frank Scheer was looking for when it came up for auction recently. Scheer is the curator of the Railway Mail Service Library in Boyce, Virginia.

He says the main focus of the RMS Library are primary source documents pertaining to the Railway Mail Service, but on occasion other interesting artifacts are added to the collection.

His newest acquisition is a U.S. Mint registered mail crate for shipping gold to Fort Knox during the 1930s, when gold was worth between \$20 and \$35 per troy ounce.

### Where the Crate Originated

Scheer is proud to have the crate, and he knows the story behind it. Time, circumstance and price allowed him to buy it at auction, and it is on display at the RMS Library.

The box was given to Victor Wright, an employee at the Denver Mint from 1980 to 2009. A small plaque on the box thanks him for his service. The crate had been stored at the San Francisco Mint before it was given to Wright.

The artifact is a gold bullion strong box made of wood and iron, stenciled "US

Mail" on the front and back. It measures 10.5 x 12 x 11.5 inches tall, and the wood is an inch thick. The box weighs 29 pounds. Tongue in cheek, Scheer says that this very specialized piece of postal history would not fit in a stamp album!

He explains that gold bars would have been placed inside the crate and then secured with a Treasury Department registered mail lock. Scheer estimates it would have weighed about 500 pounds, so four burly men would have been lifting 125 pounds apiece, using two steel rods that clipped under the corner hooks.

The crates were laid along the floor of a storage mail car, with an armed railway mail clerk or postal inspector acting as a guard in the car. Scheer is uncertain about how many cars were in a chartered train to Fort Knox, but he estimates there were 20.

#### Value of the Gold

If we assume there were ten crates per storage mail car, there would have been 200 crates on a train. Each box would have held

about \$140,000 worth of gold, at 1930s prices. That works out to \$1.4 million worth of gold per car. and that means, on a 20-car train, the guards were responsible for \$28 million in gold.

Each crate held about 7,000 troy ounces of gold, and in today's market (about \$1,800 per troy ounce as this is written) a box would be worth more than \$12 million. Each car would have about \$123 million in gold, and a 20-car

train would carry nearly \$2.5 billion!

Rather than being stored out of sight, a retirement gift to a Denver Mint employee has a permanent home in the Railway Mail Service Library where its history may easily be shared with visitors and historians everywhere.

# A Few Simple Rules for Borrowing and Returning Books

Thank you to those members who legibly print their name and daytime phone and return their borrowed books and periodicals on time.

You're missing a major membership perk if you belong at the \$25-a-year level and haven't checked out books from the RMPL. It's easy to do. We just ask you to follow our procedures:


- You'll find a checkout card in each book. Please fill it out by printing legibly and give the card to the volunteer behind the desk, who will then put a post-it note with the due date inside the front cover.. This earns you the right to keep the book for two weeks.
- 2. If you want to keep the book longer, please call before the due date, and you will receive an additional two-week renewal (303 759-9921).
- 3. Return the book on time.

That's it. It's as easy as one, two, three.

Some borrowers have trouble with No. 3, "Return the book on time." If you are not one of those people, please skip the next paragraph. What follows is a short lecture for those errant souls who keep books too long.

If books are not returned in a timely manner, you may be charged for the replacement costs of the materials, your membership may be at risk and the board may become involved.

Ouch! The library takes book returns seriously, and we hope borrowers will be considerate and ensure returns are made on time so others may use the material, too.



Here is the proper way to check out a book from the RMPL. Legibly print your name and daytime phone number, heed the due date or extend it for two weeks by calling us before it's due.

The RMPL lends books to members who can't make it to the library by offering checkout privileges through the mail.

Of course, our plea to return books on time also applies to those materials. Follow the instructions in the online catalog (rmpldenver.org) for information.

The RMPL is open six hours a day, six days a week.

If you would like to view her exhibit, or any of the special collections, please call the front desk to make an appointment.


# Collectors Club of Chicago Donation to RMPL

# RMPL Online Catalog Adds Periodicals

You may have known that you can search the RMPL online catalog but did you know that periodicals are now included in the search results? There are currently more than 550 different periodicals in the catalog and the list is growing. Instead of just presenting updated instructions for periodicals, I thought this might be a good time to give a refresher course on searching RMPL holdings.

There are more than 8,500 items in the RMPL online catalog, so finding what you are searching for can sometimes feel like a daunting task.

There are two ways to access the catalog through the RMPL website (www.rmpldenver.org). One is by using the **Quick Catalog Search** under the left panel menu on the main RMPL website homepage (1) in **Figure 1**). After filling in the text box and pressing the enter key (or clicking **Search**, 2), a program will perform a keyword search of the catalog and then display the results (if any) on the next page.

A more powerful search can be found by clicking **Online Card Catalog** on the home page. That will take you directly to the **Advanced Search** page.

Here you are presented with several options on how

a search will be performed. The first field, **Keyword** is a generic search (same as the **Quick Catalog Search**) which searches through the author, title, series, notes, publisher and contents field of the catalog. The 'Title', 'Author' and 'Subject' fields are used to search only in those areas of the catalog.


The **Advanced Search** page also has options for limiting the results. For example, if you only wanted to show results that are periodicals, select **Periodical** from the **Medium 6** drop down box. By default, periodicals will be included in all searches if there are any that match.

To eliminate periodicals from the results, uncheck the **Search to include philatelic periodicals** check box. Also by default, books from the Western History collection are not included in searches unless you check the **Search to include Western History Library** . This is where all information on railroads will be found.


Search results display the call number, title, author and date published for items matching your search.

Figure 2 is the result of entering the word **nuclear** into the **Keyword** field in Figure 1.

As you can see under the **Search Results 9**, if

periodicals are found for your search, they will be displayed with a **Call Number** of **Periodical** . To view the details of any item in the list, simply click the **Call Number** link.


If you click for **Nuclear stamp news**, your screen will go to the next page (**Figure 3**), titled **Details 1**. Here, you will find which issues the RMPL has on the shelves under **Holdings: 1**.

In this instance, you will find the library has issues from 1981-1982 Vol. 1 complete, 1982-1983 Vol. 2 complete, and Whole No. 10 from 1983-1984.

These instructions make a search for periodicals appear to be harder than it is. Give it a try and you'll find it only takes a few seconds.

Thanks to Mike Milam and Sue Dunn who have compiled the periodical listings for the database, with additional help from librarian Ellengail Beuthel. The job has taken many, many hours. Good work!

Finally, if you were curious how all this works, I wrote the program in the Java



programming language using the Struts framework. The data is housed in a MySQL database and is served up through a Tomcat web server, all of which is running on a Linux server in Dallas, Texas. If you have any questions about the online catalog, please feel free to contact me through the library.

# **RMPL Board Summary**

Meeting of August 23, 2012

m T}$  here were several announcements for the record:

- A visit by DU Library School students in late June went exceedingly well.
- One of the two Xerox copiers is working fine, but the production model in the *Scribblings* office is experiencing all sorts of maladies which are seriously affecting publications.
- Two significant donations have been received: one in the amount of \$5,000 from an anonymous donor, and the other in the amount of \$600 from the United Postal Stationery Society.
- Dalene Thomas has donated her gold award winning exhibit, "Pharos: Lighthouses of the World," to the RMPL's Special Collections.
- RMPL Board member Don Dhonau has announced he will step down as the donations writer because of problems with his eyes. He will remain as corresponding secretary, but we are asking for volunteers to step forward to work with Don on correspondence with members who donate materials.
- We were informed that the 3rd Quarter 2012 issue of *Philatelic Literature Review* had an article on the RMPL by Larry Nix.
- Swathed pillows with stamp designs, table cloths and curtains in the annex are the work of Danette Ellison, our one and only member from Arkansas. Danette is making these, free of labor charges, in her Arkansas sewing facilities.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

The financial report for the first six months of the 2012 budget was reviewed and approved. A copy of it is available to any member upon request.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

The replacement of the parking lot in front of 2048 S. Pontiac Way has been placed on hold until the results of the October bulk lot auction are known. A preliminary cost estimate was \$6,500, but RMPL volunteers familiar with the nature and scope of the work are not satisfied that it can be done for that amount. Once we know how much the auction takes in, we will probably target next May or June for the job.

The annual picnic is scheduled for August 25th at the RMPL between 6:00 and 8:00 PM.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

APS StampShow in Sacramento was enjoyable and informative. Members who went say the RMPL's name seems to be well known everywhere.

World Stamp Show-NY 2016 needs volunteers.

Details are on page 15. There is a good chance the RMPL may participate in a super booth with many other libraries.

The RMPL's server equipment has been switched to a less expensive, greater capacity site which handles our web page, the online catalog (including the new periodicals database described on pages 4 and 5), and the preliminary *This Was Colorado* digital project. The server is capable of handling more additions in the future.

The board voted to pay for small memorial plaques to be mounted on RMSS frames for the following: Jack Willard, Bill Bauer, Bill Dunn, Jim Ozment, Joe & Vi Weinman, and Nicholas Bede.

A full scale audit will be deferred until 2013. It will cost approximately \$4,000.

A review of the library's Articles of Incorporation was deferred until the next board meeting.

A boiler plate memorandum of agreement has been written to be used for any organization that wants to use the RMPL's copier equipment to print publications. It establishes costs and RMPL principles. The board voted to accept it, with revisions to be made to strengthen wording to prohibit organizations from publishing documents that hurt the hobby, are not in good taste, or defame other organizations.

The issue of payment of salaries for staff or expenses of volunteers was brought up by President Lugo. The RMPL's long-standing policy has been one of not paying expenses of volunteers or employing paid staff. That policy has served us in good stead, but in Lugo's opinion is affecting our ability to undertake new activities, particularly in the digital and information technology arena, and affects our ability to write grants that include staff reimbursement. After a long discussion, no vote was taken, but the board leans toward three things:

- There should be no reimbursement of expenses to volunteers.
- There should be a case by case decision by the board for payments to staff and volunteers that are required to successfully undertake and conclude grant proposals.
- There should be discussions to outline the tasks and knowledge skills of a paid librarian (more than likely part-time) to handle the inflow of books and periodicals and their processing. Funds for the position will come from an \$80,000 librarian's fund established by the board nearly a decade ago. The committee to undertake development of the position description includes Don Dhonau, Bob Blatherwick and Ellengail Beuthel. No deadline has been set for the development of a position description.

# Korean Philately

A nation with a fascinating philatelic, socioeconomic, political, and military history is the subject this time. The journal of the English language Korea Stamp Society, entitled *Korean Philately*, has been printed since 1954. Its pages cover subjects and materials from both the People's Democratic Republic of Korea (North Korea) as well as from the Republic of Korea (South Korea).

Korea has a long postal history with many different aspects and characteristics. This can lead a collector into some surprising areas of philately.


Periods of stamp issuing interest include: the independent kingdom (roughly to 1905), revenue and local stamps under Japanese suzerainty (between 1905 and 1945), and stamps and related material from the existence of two separate republics since 1945.

The pages of *Korean Philately* reflect a wide variety of issues, usually in short, snappy articles. My review of the journal was focused on runs we have from the early 1990s and from 2001-2008. Most of those articles were in black and white, with a great deal of attention paid to Japanese revenue stamps used on the peninsula, as well as articles about the Korean War. Space is taken up by many tables and covers, and that appears to be one reason articles are so brief. I appreciate the fact there is no advertising.

A more recent issue, from November 2008, is in our holdings. The cover is in color (not the rest of the issue) and there is a lengthy article featuring censored and military postal history that is enhanced by many postal history images.

The society's webpage illustrates stamp issues of both governments since roughly 2001, and the cover page and index of each issue of Korean Philately since 1995 are shown. It is unfortunate nothing more of the periodical is shown.

# What Inventive People Will Do...

A considerable number of years ago, when first I encountered the Washington-Franklin series and expressed dread at dealing with the varieties, I was told, "This was when the Bureau of Engraving and Printing learned to make stamps." There certainly was a progression of papers (including experimental papers), watermarks, perforations, and printing methods during the 10 years when the series was produced. Following that progression makes understanding the series easier and more enjoyable.

The use of single line watermarked paper began in 1910, taking the place of the double line watermarked paper which had been in use since 1895. Early uses included a number of stamps perforated 12, the coil stamps perforated 8 ½, and then, in 1914, the perforated 10 series (which also gave rise to the perf. 10 Panama-Pacific varieties, Scott #401-404). The perf. 10 watermarked stamps included a series of coil stamps printed on flat plates, and the first of the coil stamps printed on rotary presses (Scott #448-458), as well as the regular issues denominated 1¢-50¢ (Scott #424-440).


Then, in late 1916, the Bureau switched to unwatermarked paper. The 10 gauge perforator was still in use, and thus we have the perf. 10 unwatermarked regular issues denominated 1¢-\$5.00, Scott #462-480. There were also unwatermarked imperforates, Scott #481-485, and some perf. 10 unwatermarked rotary press coil stamps, Scott #486-497.

However, in early 1917, the Bureau decided that regular issue stamps perforated 11 would be easier for consumers to separate than those with perf. 10. So in March 1917 the perf. 11's were issued. The unwatermarked perf. 10's had a life of only about six months, so they are scarcer than the watermarked variety of perf. 10's, which lasted for more than two years.

The certificate on the right shows how some inventive soul decided that perforating one of the (fairly common) unwatermarked imperforates of the period to make it into a perf. 10 unwatermarked stamp with unusually nice margins would be a good plan. The expertizers thought not.

This is one more way that cheaters will attempt to fool collectors. Beware. Had this stamp not been unusually nice appearing, it might have been undiscovered for a very long time.

# The Prez' Observations

residing in the northwestern parts of this country, with a passionate interest in postal rates who has authored major studies on U.S. rates. I speak of Tony Wawrukiewicz. The reason you should give him a big bear hug when you meet him is not because of his renowned rate studies, but for a more recent accomplishment that he has introduced into the philatelic world. And that is a complete, digitized,

electronic version of the U.S. Postal Bulletin from 1880 to 1971.

This was apparently a labor of love that he began many years ago, without funding, but with a vision. His "gift" to us is a fully searchable database of the thousands upon thousands of pages of the U.S. Postal Bulletin that can be found at the website www.uspostalbulletins.com. does not cost anything to belong to the website or enter into its

searches. Once you begin searches, you realize that its OCR (optical character recognition) capabilities permit every word in every issue to be searched. And those records can amount to thousands of entries by the U.S. Post Office at the tip of your finger.

I was particularly intrigued that I was able to find some information on Porto Rico in the early 1900s. I typed in search words and there were the entries for the individual years that I wanted before I could say "Rumplestiltskin." Not only were single instances of the keywords provided, but more importantly, everywhere the search word appeared in that specific bulletin was highlighted. In other words, the little screen to the left prevents you from missing any entry found in that postal bulletin.

To Tony, a magnificent thank you for the "gift" that serves an ever evolving philatelic/stamp collecting database.

And by the way, another person bearing gifts has

provided an in-depth discussion in the pages of this issue on an enhancement to our online catalog. That person is our webmaster, Travis Searls. And the gift is your accessibility, via your home computer, to our periodicals database and individual issue holdings.

To all, a most enjoyable holiday season, and best wishes for a joyous Christmas and Happy New Year.



# BULK LOT AND SUPPLIES AUCTION RESULTS

# More Than \$25,000 Raised for RMPL!



#### **AUCTION STATISTICS**

- \$25,355 realized
- 97.2% of all lots sold
- 59 floor bidders
- 46 mail bidders
- 40% of lots had mail bids
- 21 lots did not sell

The RMPL annex was full of bidders and lots for the sixth annual bulk lots auction.

Parking lots were full and on-street parking was at a premium on Saturday, October 13, as nearly 60 bidders gathered for the library's sixth annual bulk lots auction. The event raised \$25,355, an amount topped only by the 2011 auction at Rocky Mountain Stamp Show which featured the collection of supurb U.S. formed by William Stolfus.



The supplies part of the auction was held in the "garage" section of the annex.

All the money will be used for library expenses because the organization has no paid workers.

There were about 50 bidders last year, and the increase could partially attributed to a new philatelic twist, as supplies were put up for bid separately in the "garage" portion of the library annex.



Even the painting's artist, James Whistler, one of our Famous Americans, will be part of this story. 




