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Leadville 1878: Buying Your Way to the Front of the Post Office Queue




Fig. 1. Main street of Leadville in 1878-1879. The post office was in the large building in the left foreground of this drawing.

When publisher Carlye Channing Davis arrived in the mining boom town of Leadville, Colorado (Fig. 1), he described it as the "wildest and most tempestuous municipality on the face of the earth." That was in 1878, a few months before Davis and two partners began publishing *The Daily Chronicle*, which competed with several other newspapers in Leadville's vibrant community.

Davis' highly readable memoir, *Olden Times in Colorado* (published in 1916), noted that the Leadville of 1878 had no public utilities in place to provide domestic water, lighting, sewers, natural gas, or local transportation. It was a frontier town, larger in population than Denver and bustling with miners and commercial enterprises all looking to strike it rich in the silver and gold mines at 10,000 feet elevation.

The local post office was such an essential part of the Leadville community that Davis described its operations in his book. It was a busy, fourth class post office with the postmaster's salary based on the sale of stamps and with no allowance for rent, light, fuel, or assistance. But the postmaster absorbed

The President's Message

Yes, time flies. When this newsletter arrives, we will be halfway through 2018. A lot has happened since I took office and not all for the better. As with any organization, there are challenges. Your management, along with the entire volunteer staff, is working on meeting these challenges. Donations continue to flow in



and that will help with the bills. The silent auction at Rocky Mountain Stamp Show was perhaps not as good as we hoped, despite some really interesting material. Nevertheless, we netted about \$15,000.

On the positive side, we got an OK from the fire department after a yearly inspection in April. On the negative side, the smoke alarm systems in both buildings did not pass inspection. Ironically, due to the age of the buildings the systems are not required. They are now disconnected. For safety's sake, however, we are getting bids from three companies for a new integrated system. This may also help reduce the insurance bill. The board will make a decision on this in time.

The next item of business is getting additional volunteers. There are days that we are not adequately staffed for what we need to accomplish and I do not like the idea of having only ONE volunteer to close up at night. While at RMSS, I mailed 135 letters to RMPL members to ask for volunteers. My letter did not produce a single call to volunteer. This could become an issue restricting our ability to continue our current hours - six days-a-week. So, let's all see if we can jump in for a few hours a week. Please contact Dasa Metzler should you be willing to join the volunteer crew or add a few hours to your current schedule.

(Continued from page 1) those costs, apparently because it attracted cash-paying customers into his combined bank, general store, and post office.

According to Davis, the daily stage mail took as many as 20 clerks all night to hand-sort and prepare the mail for delivery the next morning.

"Long before the opening hour, a line of patrons formed in front and extended far down the street and so eager were the people to secure their letters without delay that cash in large sums, ranging from one to five dollars, was paid for positions at the head of the line," Davis recalled.

"Indeed, this practice early became so common that a few persons profited handsomely by selling their places, returning to the foot, again advancing, and selling again and again."

For years, there was only a single commercially dominated Western Union telegraph line into Leadville, making postal mail critical to the residents. "[C]ash was abundant in Leadville, and its expenditure ever lavish," according to Davis. Thus, some miners and townspeople were apparently willing to pay for an upfront spot that required less waiting in line to claim their mail.

Denver Young Collectors at the RMSS

Yes, it was that time of year again and the excitement in the air was almost palpable. The 2018 Rocky Mountain Stamp Show had arrived!

Don Dhonau, Director of the Denver Young Collectors, with the assistance of Dan Nieuwlandt, Ron Brandhorst, and Charlie Freise, carefully planned and coordinated an entire weekend of special activities. They were prepared for the Denver Young Collectors and any youngsters who might stop by the Youth Booth during the Show.

The "Denver Stamp Camp" held as part of the RMSS activities (Fig. 1) incorporates many of the objectives of the original "Stamp Camp USA" program. This year the children were presented with a series of educational programs focusing on the different ways to collect stamps, and how to protect, store, and display a collection. Children were provided a small sti-

pend and given the task of going out onto the show floor and seeking out some "special treasures" from the dealers. The children then gathered around the Youth Booth and

showed their treasures to each other. They discussed their collecting interests and the reasons for purchasing their particular stamps.

This year eleven children actively participated in the "Denver Stamp Camp" on Friday. This was almost double the number from last year! Our efforts over the past year in getting out to the local libraries and continuing our work with the Denver Area Boy Scout Council resulted in more children, as well as adults, stopping by the Youth Booth. We had eight Scouts meet the requirements for the Stamp Collecting Merit Badge in March 2018, and two additional Scouts completed the requirements during the Show on Saturday.

While the "Denver Stamp Camp" was in progress we had special activities (Fig. 2) prepared for those children who dropped by. A number of "bookcase games" were available, as well as the *Endan-*

gered Wildlife of the World, Greetings from America, Scavenger Hunt, Wildlife Safari, and Design A Stamp activities. Children were given a name tag and a blue ribbon.

As the children completed an activity, they were awarded with a special sticker which was placed on the ribbon.

Mother and daughter left the Youth Booth with big smiles, a beginner album, hinges, tongs, stock sheets, a basic book on stamp collecting, and a nice collection of Disney and world wildlife stamps (Fig. 3).

DISCOVER GOLDEN NUGGETS OF STAMP COLLECTING INFORMATION USING AUCTION CATALOGS

Searching for gold may lead to disaster or delight, depending if your quest happens in the Rockies' ravines or among the stamp collecting nuggets housed in the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library.

Antiquities dealer Forest Fenn has drawn hundreds of thrill seekers to the chase by leaving clues to a cache of gold and silver he stashed several years ago somewhere in the Rocky Mountains. At last count, four treasure hunters died after searching for this mother lode, using the clues about the chest's whereabouts encoded in a cryptic poem printed in Fenn's memoir, "The Thrill of the Chase."

You don't have to sacrifice your life as a philatelic thrill-seeker to gain access to the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library's "delightful gold mines of information," as *Kelleher's Stamp Collector's Quarterly* editor Randy Neil aptly describes our resources. Several previous articles have addressed a

variety of resources available to the stamp collector, but one area that has not been adequately explored lies in the RMPL's extensive holdings of auction catalogs - a rich, but under-utilized area of philatelic research.

In that part of the Library where antique maps are filed, our publications are printed, and stamp societies fill nooks with specialized resource books, there reside thousands of stamp auction catalogs that fill massive shelves (Fig. 1). These treasures are worth exploring. In addition, many of the "name" auction catalogs are shelved with other books in the main library. Please remember that an appointment is necessary to review the catalogs located in the Asbury building.

Why are these nuggets of information so valuable? Randy Neil believes stamp collectors de-

sire "to find out why we have such a fascinating hobby—and they found it's practically impossible to collect these tiny documents of human culture and history [stamps] without turning to some form of literature" (*Kelleher's Stamp Collector's Quarterly*, Randy Neil, "We Take This Seriously," Fourth Quarter 2017, p. 28).

Some auction catalogs in the Library's holdings go back to the 1930s, recording "name sales" of philatelic all-stars. With offices adjacent to Rockefeller Center, Siegel Auction House publishes informative catalogs with eye-catching graphics. I often turn to these resources, which furnish helpful listings of auction lots.


Suppose I own three copies of Scott #63, which features a bust of Ben Franklin (Fig. 2). This stamp was printed in shades of blue. How can you tell if you have a prized stamp in the ultramarine hue instead of the more common blue shades? The difference is worth big bucks.


I peruse Siegel catalogs that are offering this stamp. Color photography of #63's shades is right on, with true representations printed on glossy paper. Besides seeing color varieties, I am also able to trace the provenance (history of previous owners of a stamp) in the lot's description. The Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library's holdings of auction catalogs include most famous auction houses as well as many lesser known and obscure dealers.


Thomas Jefferson, who prior to when stamps were first issued in the 1840s, had a passion for acquiring books, which inspired him to build three massive collections during his life (1743 – 1826). He helped friends form libraries, suggesting volumes suitable to their interests. Jefferson often purchased volumes for acquaintances or lent them his books

Similarly, with Jeffersonian zeal, browse these philatelic catalogs. Share information you gather with other stamp collectors. Alert newcomers to the nuggets of knowledge you have unearthed. You will shine as a gold miner of philatelic wisdom. And you'll still live to enjoy stamp collecting.

Auction Results

The Library conducted a successful silent auction at the Rocky Mountain Stamp Show again this year. We had 850 lots with a total estimated value of over \$110,000 and with the starting bids adding up to more than \$18,000. We do not have the final tally as of the Scribblings' article submission deadline, but it is estimated that we raised about \$15,000.

The key item sold was the U.S. RW1 signed by the artist, Ding Darling. It went for \$700. and is illustrated here with the accompanying letter. While we were happy with the knock-down price, the purchaser should be ecstatic as experts in the Duck Stamp field estimated the value at \$4,000. The availability of such unique items (and the bargains they represent) is a tribute to our many members and others who donate material to the RMPL. Many lots offered similar price/value and demonstrate the win-win that RMPL auctions provide our philatelic community.

Unsold Lots

The Library has several hundred unsold lots available that can be purchased for the starting bid.

Financial Reports

Tim Heins reviewed handouts showing income and expenses through April 2018 and a sheet titled Financial Facts as of April 30, 2018. The latter listed memorial donations, specific fund donations, and account balances through April 2018. It was moved and seconded to approve the financial reports. The motion passed.

Old Business

Concrete Work in Rear of Buildings

Bill Crabbs had received cost figures from the person who poured the pad for the new shed. Rich Palestro is checking on this. The pad for the dumpster is no longer needed (see Trash under New Business).

Need for Volunteers

Tonny is preparing a volunteer recruitment mailing to be sent to all RMPL members within a 25-27 mile radius of the library.

New Business

Computer Speed and Upgrade

Tonny reported that he was finally able to meet with Century Link representatives and, with the installation of a new modem, we have increased our speed from 1.5 mb to 40 mb. We also now have the ability to make unlimited long distance calls within the U.S., Canada, and Mexico.

Fire Inspection Report

The Fire Inspector for South Metro recently inspected the library. The inspector found no problems. He did say that we are not required to have smoke alarms, but if we do and they are connected to the alarm system, they require annual testing. The inspector recommended that we disconnect the current smoke alarms and consider looking into new systems.

It was moved and seconded that we disconnect the current smoke alarm system from the alarm company and keep everything else we have. The motion passed. New safety options will be reviewed for our hard-wired system.

Outdoor Lighting

Rich Palestro has looked into the outdoor lighting needs and he has a list of needed repairs and materials. Work on this will begin soon.

It was agreed at the last board meeting to have an all-members picnic at the library to celebrate the library's 25th anniversary. The date is set for Saturday, August 4 at 6:00 p.m. Rich Palestro, Dasa Metzler and Jim Kilbane volunteered to serve on a planning committee for the event. Dasa reported that we would have the whole event catered, and that we should plan for around 70 people. Information will be posted in *Scribblings*.

We have learned that the USPS no longer offers special event cancels for cachets, but Marc Silberman is probably going to put together a souvenir sheet. Jim Kilbane will look into getting a banner for the event. Families of deceased members and others will also be invited. The event also will be announced in various philatelic society and library websites, etc. Special recognitions are also being considered.

Garden Maintenance
