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The Hidden Secrets of the 2 and 3 Cent Large Bank Note Stamps of 1870 - 1894

This is the second installment of an article that appeared in the November - December 2023 issue of *Scribblings*. The first article featured the 1¢ Large Bank Note stamps of 1870 - 1894. This article focuses on the 2¢ and 3¢ Large Bank Note stamps (*figure 1*).

STEVE MCGILL BRINGS HOME THE CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS AWARD





RMPL member Steve McGill received the Benjamin and Naomi Wishnietsky World Series Champion of Champions award during the 2024 Great American Stamp Show, August 15 - 18, in Hartford, CT.

To qualify for the award exhibits must win the grand award at an APS sponsored World Series of Philately show during the past exhibiting cycle (July 2023 -June 2024). Steve's exhibit qualified for the Champion of Champions competition when he won the grand award at the 2023 Indypex Show held October 6 - 8, 2023, in Noblesville, IN. Steve's exhibit, "Britain's Marvelous Machins," was one of twenty-one qualifying exhibits this year.

In 1967, the Machin stamp series replaced the Wildings series. The stamps continue in print today and there are more than 7,000 cataloged varieties known.

Steve is a frequent visitor at the Library. When you see him, take a moment, and congratulate him on this significant achievement.

During the 1870s, the Post Office issued contracts to three different security printing companies: the National Bank Note Company, the Continental Bank Note Company, and the American Bank Note Company. With multiple companies using the same stamp dies, different security measures and different paper types, collectors are faced with a challenge. If the stamps, printed by different companies, look the same, how does one identify which is which?

In 1870, the National Bank Note Company held the contract for printing postage stamps. They produced a series of eleven stamps ranging in value from 1¢ through 90¢. Each of the stamps featured the portrait of a past President or important government official.

In 1873, the Continental Bank Note Company took over the printing contract from the National Bank Note Company due to a number of complaints about the quality of the printing. Continental took possession of some of the dies, paper used for printing, and printing plates. The supply of paper ranged from thick to thin varieties. Some philatelic experts surmise the paper types obtained from the National Bank Note Company, along with the Continental Bank Note Company paper stock, total around 13 varieties. To identify which company printed which stamps "secret

marks" were added to the printing plates and dies.


In 1877, the United States Congress directed that all printing of notes and securities be transferred to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. The Post Office continued to have postage stamps printed by private companies. The decision was a major blow to the security printing companies. In 1879, the National Bank Note Company, the Continental Bank Note Company, and the American Bank Note Company, merged under the name of The American Bank Note Company, and continued to print postage stamps for the Post Office until 1894.

In addition to the secret marks added by the Continental Bank Note Company, the American Bank Note Company wanted to be able to tell which company printed which stamp. The company printed their stamps on a soft, porous paper, reengraved some of the designs, and introduced changes to some of the colors used in the printing of the stamps.

There were a number of "special printings" made of these stamps and they are extremely rare. Many of the higher value "grilled stamps" are also extremely rare and quite valuable. When going through your stamp collection, as well as accumulations, always take the time to check for grills on the Bank Note issues.

The 2¢ Large Bank Note Stamps

Images of the seven 2¢ Large Bank Note stamps, with the Scott catalog numbers are provided on the following pages for reference. There are five distinct types of the 2¢ Andrew Jackson stamps and the two types of the 2¢ George Washington stamp. The three different companies printed the Andrew Jackson stamps. The easiest of the Andrew Jackson stamps to identify are Scott #135, as it has a security grill and Scott #178 as the color is significantly different from the other stamps. The remaining three Andrew Jackson stamps are more difficult to identify due to the different paper types as well as the secret marks. The two George Washington stamps, Scott #210 and #213, are easily identified due to the distinct colors. The American Bank Note Company printed the George Washington stamps. It is important to note in the past few years the Scott Catalog is listing two grill sizes for the Large Bank Note stamps, grill type "H" and type "I."



This stamp was printed on hard, white paper with a secret mark.

printed on hard, white paper. The color was changed from brown to orange-vermillion. The stamp has the same secret mark as Scott #157.





Scott #210, red-brown American Bank Note Company The stamp is easy to identify as the portrait changed to George Washington. The stamp was printed on soft porous paper.

Scott #183, vermillion American Bank Note Company

This stamp was printed on soft porous paper with the secret mark. The color was changed from orange -vermillion to vermillion.



Scott #213, green American Bank Note Company The stamp is easy to identify as the portrait changed to George Washington. The stamp was printed on soft porous paper.

Is it hard or soft paper?

Hard Paper: smooth surface, when held up to a light it is translucent. Under magnification the perforations are cleaner with fewer stray fibers. Hard paper is fairly white in color, some call it greyish or bluish white. Hard paper reflects more light when viewed under UV light than soft paper.

Soft Paper: coarse with uneven texture, cannot see through it when held up to a light. When held up to the light a looser weave or mesh pattern is seen. The soft paper seems slight yellowish compared to the hard paper. Under magnification there are stray fibers on the perforations. The paper has a looser weave. Soft paper is fairly "dead" when viewing it under UV light. The soft paper appears mottled, almost opaque like newsprint when held up to a sharp light.



The 3¢ Large Bank Note Stamps

Provided on the following pages are images of the six distinct types of the large 3¢ Bank Note stamps. The portrait of George Washington is featured on each of the stamps. They were printed by the National, Continental and American Bank Note companies in a variety of shades and colors, with or without grill marks and with secret marks on some issues. The easiest of the stamps to identify are Scott #136, issued with a grill mark, Scott #147 issued without a grill mark and Scott #214, issued in a distinct color.

A straightforward way to determine if your stamp was printed on hard or soft paper is to compare it to similar stamps. Scott #65, the common 3¢ Washington stamp from the 1860s is printed on hard paper. Scott #231, the common 2¢ Columbian stamp from 1893 is printed on soft, porous paper.


Scott #184, green American Bank Note Company.

This stamp was printed on soft, porous paper with a secret mark. figure 11 - 3¢ American Bank Note stamps




Scott #207, blue-green American Bank Note Company.

This stamp was printed and re-engraved on soft, porous paper. An additional secret mark was added to the background shading below the "TS" in the word "CENTS."



This stamp was printed on soft, porous paper and in a new color.

The cover for this issue (figures 1) was carried by was mostly used for short, local routes, particularly in Alaska Dog Team Post in 1943. It is addressed to A. the winter. For example, the cover shown here went E. Koestler, a cover dealer in "the lower 48." Although dog sled mail is best known from Alaska, dogs have been used to carry mail in other states, including Michigan and Maine.

In 1986 as part of the transportation series, the US issued a coil stamp (Scott #2135) picturing a dog sled from the 1920s (figure 2). The stamp issued in 2009 for the 50th anniversary of Alaska statehood (*figure 3*) shows a sled dog team in the foreground. It is on the Iditarod Trail being driven by DeeDee Jonrowe, a veteran dog team racer. The covers of the Jack London stamp booklets (Scott BK150,1,2) picture a dog sled and team and a sled dog.


By 1901, a network of dog sled mail routes had been established in Alaska. The route number #78140 on the (*figure 1*) cover is part of this network. The longest route was the Iditarod Trail, extending 2,300 miles from Seward to Nome. Note that this is the length of the trail used by the sled dog teams. It is neither the flying distance nor the length of the current Iditarod Trail race.

With the advent of air mail in the 1920s, many of the mail routes were replaced by air routes. Dog sled mail

from Ruby to Kokrines, about 27 miles along the Yukon River. The envelope was cancelled Nov 20, 1943, in Ruby with a Kokrines receiving cancel (figure 1a) dated Dec 10, 1943. The post office in Kokrines existed from 1907 - 1957; the Ruby Post Office was established in 1911 and is still in use. The cover was probably reviewed by a censor in Alaska.

The last scheduled mail was carried on January 8, 1963, by Chester Noongwook from Gambell to Savoonga on St. Lawrence Island in the Bering sea between Alaska and Russia. However, mail is still carried on some of the sleds participating in the Iditarod race.

M(arie) "Fay" Muridge created the cachet. She was born in California but lived most of her life in Washington State. Most of her cachets were on naval covers. Dogs often wore leather (moose hide) booties to protect their feet from the ice and cold, but these are not visible in the cachet. Teams were usually 8 - 10 dogs but only seven are seen here. Mailbags can be seen in the sled. Mail sleds usually carried 500 - 700 pounds in a load, or up to 100 pounds per dog. For particularly difficult routes, more dogs were used.


AUGUST 2024 John Audubon Program

Regina Domenici gave a presentation on John Audubon and birds on stamps during the August CYPHER Stamp Club Meeting. He explained how the canal was built, how the locks work, and the difficulties the French and American governments experienced while building the canal. Dan brought in postal history items from his personal collection as examples. The children were extremely interested in the Canal Zone "crash cover."

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Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library Reorganization of United States Stamp Sales

Library visitors of late may have noticed the ongoing reorganization of both U.S. mint and used stamps. An industrious group of volunteers have been identifying, consolidating, and labeling similar stamps so collectors can fill the needs of their collections. Volunteers review the stamps to ensure the best quality ones are available for purchase.

Large black binders contain both mint and used single common stamps (catalog value up to \$1.00). These stamps now sell for ten cents each. Mint and used single stamps cataloging \$1.00 and higher are priced at 40% of catalog value. The values are adjusted for centering, perforations, or other small flaws where applicable. These stamps are found in small binders in the US stamp sales section.



Old Business

The prior meeting minutes were approved via email in July.

Financial report (Bill Douglass): Bill Douglass absent, the Board approved August financial reports.

Second Bequest (Tonny Van Loij) Tonny stated the RMPL received a second Caswell family bequest of \$700,000. The RMPL Financial Group reported \$525,000 was placed into a CD and the remainder went into an Exchange Traded Fund.

Last version of election Bylaw changes (Eric Carlson and Regina Domenici): Bylaws have been updated to reflect Board and election changes. The final version is posted on the website. No member comments were received regarding the Bylaw changes posted in July Scribblings. Two new Director positions will be appointed due to these Bylaw changes. A notice will be placed in Scribblings encouraging any interested members to contact a Board member.

Meeting room restroom upgrades (Gary Withrow): Over the Labor Day weekend, the 2048 restroom makeover included a new sink, mirror, commode, grab bars and fresh paint.

Volunteer Christmas dinner and gifts (Paul Domenici): The DoubleTree Hotel is reserved for December 7, 2024, to honor the Library volunteers. Volunteers may bring a guest to the buffet dinner. Invitations will be mailed in mid-October.

Special Delivery of Dreams Scholarship update (Gary Withrow and Regina Domenici): Two \$2,500

scholarships targeting 4-year college students were added to the Special Delivery of Dreams scholarship on BOLD.org. Currently, the scholarship committee is reviewing 167 total applicants.

New construction vs. new location for additional storage (Steve Schweighofer): Background: The current County building requirements make it impossible to add any free-standing storage space on the property. A motion was approved to form a fiveperson committee to investigate opportunities and requirements to relocate to a new building.

Painting outside of buildings (Gary Withrow): Gary obtained 4 preliminary bids on painting the outside of both buildings. The bids ranged from \$5000 -\$8000. A decision will be made pending further clarification regarding type of paint used by each provider.

Automatic external defibrillators (AEDs): Background: In January 2023, the Board previously approved the purchase of the AEDs but due to equipment and training costs, postponed their purchase. Richard Porto reminded the Board of the value of having the AEDs in case of cardiac arrest at the Library. The Board agreed to follow through with the purchase and training of AEDs.

New Business

Marketing consultant: Steve Nadler recommended engaging a marketing consultant specializing in social media to promote the Library. He suggested the Board create a Marketing Committee to investigate better opportunities to advertise and publicize the value of the services available at the RMPL.
