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Early German Postage Stamps 1850 - 1874by Charlie Freise

As a general worldwide collector my philatelic interests are varied. I can bounce from subject to subject, begin one project only to get sidetracked by another

One recent evening, while working on a program for the CYPHER Stamp Club, I discovered myself going down a rabbit hole of inestimable depths. With the television droning in the back-

ground, relaxing to the soothing guitar riffs and drum solos of AC/DC and Ozzy, out of nowhere I was gobsmacked. I began wondering what the circumstances were surrounding the German states discontinuing to issue their own postage stamps and issuing stamps for the First German Empire (figure 1). Little did I know how complicated and convoluted the answer would be.

I found myself researching the Roman Empire, Carolingian Kings, the Metzger Post, and the Thurn and Taxis postal monopoly. Please accept my apologies and understand the reasons behind condensing the following historical facts and events. The entire history behind the formation of the First German Empire will not fit in a single issue of *Scribblings*.

In 1798, the Holy Roman Empire was invaded and crushed by Napoleon's forces. The treaty of Lunéville (1801) and the mediatization of 1803 abolished most free imperial cities and secularized the ecclesiastical principalities. These territories, along with their inhabitants, were absorbed by different dynastic states. In 1806, upon the defeat of Prussia, Napoleon dictated the Treat of Pressburg which included the complete dissolution of the Holy Roman Empire. Napoleon established a German client state of France known as the Confederation of the Rhine (figure 2). This provided for the reshaping and redistribution of the territories and holdings of more than a hundred princes and counts, as well as those of hundreds of imperial knights. The holdings and territories were absorbed by the Confederation's

member states. Thurn and Taxis lost its mail service monopoly when Napoleon granted the Confederation of the Rhine *(figure 2)* the right to conduct postal services.

Throughout the 1800s until the late 1850s the former states of the Holy Roman Empire were engaged in a series of conflicts and wars. Loose alliances between the individual states and other countries had them fighting each other for decades.

In 1857, King Frederick William IV of Prussia suffered a stroke and was unable to rule. His brother, William, became Prince Regent in 1858, he was crowned King Wilhelm I in 1861. During this three-year period there was a shuffling of authority within the Prussian military. In 1860 a constitutional crisis arose as the parliament and the King both wanted control of the military budget. Otto von Bismark was appointed to the position of Minister-President in 1862 and resolved the crisis in favor of the war minister.

Bismark sought to form a unified German state linked to the Hohenzollern dynasty. Some historians believe this is one of the primary contributions to the creation of the later German Empire in 1871. In the first half of the 1860s both Austria and Prussia contended over who would speak for the independent German States. In 1866, after the defeat of Austria during the Austro-Prussian war, Prussia began to assert its dominance over the German states and defended German interests. With the 1866 Peace of Prague, Prussia pressured Austria and its allies into accepting the dissolution of the German Confederation (an association of German States under the leadership of the Austrian

Empire). This resulted in the formation of the North German Confederation led by the Kingdom of Prussia in 1867. The independent German states continued to issue their own postal stamps until 1868 (figure 3).

The postage stamps of the individual German states are an interesting area to explore. They were printed over a brief period (with the exception of Bavaria and Württemberg). They are found imperforate, perforated, embossed, and rouletted. The perforations range from 7 up to 14½. Some of the stamps were printed on thin paper, with or without silk threads, and a couple stamps from Prussia (Scott #21 and #22) were printed on Goldbeater's Skin. Many of the stamps were printed on different colored papers leading to a wide range of shades and color types. A variety of watermarks are found on some of the stamps, especially those from Bavaria and Württemberg.

The remnants of the Thurn and Taxis postal system survived in Germany up to 1867 (figure 4). On January 1, 1868, the North German Confederation began to manage the mail and issue postage stamps (figure 5). With the creation of the North German Confederation Thurn and Taxis had to sell its remaining mail carrying privileges.

The North German Postal Union (Norddeutsher Postbezirk), to accommodate the different monetary systems in the various German states, issued stamps in

two currencies, groschen for the Northern District and kreuzer for the Southern District. The stamps are distinguished by framing the value number in a circle for groschen stamps and an oval for the kreuzer stamps. All the stamps were inscribed "Norddeutscher Postbezirk." A special ¼ schilling stamp was issued for Hamburg with an additional inscription of "Stadtpostbrief Hamburg."



Tensions between the French Empire, led by Emperor Napoleon III, and the North German Confederation (figure 6) began to grow and a dispute concerning the new king of Spain resulted in the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. At the time, the original North German Confederation had a population of about 30,000,000 with about 80% of those living in Prussia, thus making up about 75% of the future German Empire. Under these circumstances the southern German states (Baden, Bavaria, Hesse-Darmstadt, and Württemberg), previously opposing the Confederation, decided to join. Following the victory in the war with France, the German princes and senior military commanders proclaimed King Wilhelm I "German Emperor" at the Palace of Versailles. The transition from the North German Confederation to the Empire was completed when the Constitution of the German Empire took effect on May 4, 1871. France recognized the German Empire on May 10, 1871, with the Treaty of Frankfurt.

The first stamps of the new German Empire were issued on January 1, 1872. The stamps were perforated 13³/₄ x 14¹/₄ and have a small, embossed eagle and shield (kleiner brustschild) in the center (*figure 9*). The stamps were issued in two currencies, groschen for use in the northern states (*table 1a*) and kreuzer for use in the southern states (*table 1b*).

The small shield stamps were deemed an inappropriate representation of the German eagle and were reprinted with a larger embossed eagle and shield (grosser brustschild) (figure 10). The new stamps,

with the larger eagle and shield were released between June and November of 1872 (tables 2a and 2b). Both sets of stamps were issued with values ranging from \(^1/4\text{gr} - 5\text{gr}\) and 1kr - 18kr. New values of 2\(^1/2\text{gr}\) and 9kr were released with the issuance of the large eagle and shield stamps.

Postal stationery items exist for the following values: ½gr green, ½gr red-orange, ½gr orange-brown, 1gr rose, 1kr green, 2kr orange, 3kr rose, 7kr ultramarine, 9kr red-brown, and 18kr bister values. Examples of the eagle and shield stamps that are imperforate are cut from postal stationery items (figure 7).

Forgeries of the 5g stamp (figure 8) were made in Elbing (Elbinger Postfälschung). The forgeries were made by a postal worker of this town and are rather deceptive. Both the small and large embossed eagle and shield stamps were forged. The stamps typically have a horseshoe cancellation (Hufeisenstempel).

The eagle and shield stamps were designed by Heinrich G. Schilling, printed by Preußische Staatsdruckerei, Berlin. They were issued without watermarks, perforated 13-3/4 x 14-1/4, and typographed with embossing.

exist. These were used in the town of Stettin (known as Szczecin in Polish), a few sheets of these stamps were given to the public. Other genuine imperforate stamps exist for the ½g and 1g values. It is highly advisable to have examples of these items expertised prior to purchasing.

Some of the small eagle stamps have a higher catalog value than the large eagle stamps. Forgers were known to iron out the large, embossed eagle and then add a new embossed image of the small eagle to make the stamp more valuable. The 2k stamp is an exception. In this instance the larger eagle is more valuable than the small eagle. Forgeries of the 2k stamp exist where the small eagle has been replaced with the large eagle.

Examples of stamps with inverted embossed images are forgeries. The forger, Georges Fouré is known to have made examples of the 7k stamp with inverted embossed images.

In conclusion, I found the journey through history and learning about early German postal history to be utterly fascinating. For the most part, collecting the early postal history of Germany, and the individual German states is affordable. Yes, there are certain stamps that are beyond the budget of the average collector, but the majority of the stamps and color varieties are reasonably priced.

Genuine imperforate examples of the 5g bister stamp (Note: If you want to learn more about early German postal history the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library has more than 60 different books and publications related to German Postal History. Covering the World



A Columbian Cover

The sixteen stamps issued for the Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893 are commonly known as the Columbians. They are usually considered to be the first commemorative stamps issued by the United States although sometimes the 1869 pictorials are given this honor. They are also a set missing from many US stamp collections.

The attractive cover for this issue of *Scribblings* was provided by Charles Freise, editor of *Scribblings*. It has a partial set of the lower values of the Columbians, sent from New York City to Spa, in eastern Belgium. It was mailed on 15 February 1893, transited Bruxelles on 24 February, and reached Spa on 25 February. From manuscript notations on the back of the cover, it appears that delivery

was attempted the same day and again (successfully?) on 26 February.

The total franking is 28¢ which paid the overseas UPU rate of 5¢ per ounce and the 8¢ registration fee. It contains a handwritten letter in French. This cover was purchased many years ago. At the time, it was claimed that fewer than thirty covers are known franked with Columbian stamps with a New York City registration label and with Belgium as the destination. This is the only recorded example of a Columbian cover to Belgium paying four times the first-class overseas rate. These claims cannot be verified; however, research continues to confirm their veracity.

The letter was sent by R. Hobart Smith, a well-known lawyer and collector of antiquities and coins (and perhaps stamps?) in New York City. It is addressed to the Count Alberic du Chastel, a collector of ancient coins with a fine collection of antiquities, music, books, (and perhaps stamps?). He was also reported to have a fine mustache! An interesting account of his adult life, written by Suzette, daughter of one of Count du Chastel's servants, is available on the web.

There is the possibility this is a philatelic cover. It was mailed one month after the stamps were issued from one collector to another (although neither is

mentioned as being a stamp collector). A handwritten note, in French, was included in the cover.

Using Google Translate the note refers to documents and two examples of the \$4.00, which were all separated at the Post Office. Smith offers to have the recipient return them and he might be able to obtain specimens as requested later. Smith mentions he hopes the "tub" arrives in perfect condition and thanks the Count for his careful actions related to the matter of the loans.

The number of low face-value stamps used is unusual, but it may have been a matter of convenience and availability. One wonders, too, what could have weighed four ounces and fitted into a #10 envelope. Regardless, it is an unusual and probably unique cover.

That is it for now. Send me information about your favorite cover for the next issue.

FEBRUARY 2025 Superhero Theme

Dan Nieuwlandt presented a program focusing on "Superheroes" on stamps from around the world. Dan also discussed well known cartoon and movie characters featured on postage stamps. March 2025 First Day Covers

He discussed how he researches the information in the USPS Postal Bulletin and sends his covers to the Stamp Fulfillment Center for the cancels. The club members also went over the requirements for the Club Single-Frame Competitive Exhibit at the upcoming stamp show. Children will be preparing their individual pages in April and May.



WHAT IS AN HPO COVER?


The term "HPO (Highway Post Office)" is used when describing a cover that was processed and cancelled on a post office bus. The first highway postal route began on February 10, 1941, from Washington, DC, to Harrisonburg, Virginia. Operations were delayed several years until the end of World War II. After the war, 400 routes were established between 1948 and 1955. Inside the bus was a sorting table with pigeonholes for sorting the mail. There was storage for as many as 150 mail bags in the back of the bus. With the development of mechanical sorting methods, the highway postal service was phased out. The last run of the Highway Post Office was on June 30, 1974, in Ohio.

Another Way of Communicating

It is estimated that more than 430 million people in the world have disabling hearing loss. Nearly 35 million children are included in this number. American Sign Language (ASL) has existed for more than 200 years. It is a combination of the French Sign Language (LSF) and ASL developed by Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet and Laurent Cleric. They are also the founders of the first school for the deaf in America. Stamps featuring sign language have been issued by many countries, a few are pictured below. Using the ASL chart can you decipher the sign language message? (Answer key is on page 19).

Board of Directors Meeting March 20, 2025

March 20, 2025

The meeting was called to order at 2:59 PM

Board Members Present: Tonny Von Loij, Jim Kilbane, Bill Douglass, Steve Schweighofer, Bill Blankemeier, Eric Carlson, Paul Domenici, Regina Domenici, Charlie Freise, and John Peters. Rod Haenni and Gary Withrow attended via ZOOM. **Visitors:** Ray Vreeland and Nancy Barlowe.

Old Business

The prior meeting minutes were approved via email in January.

Financials (Bill Douglass): The Board reviewed financial statements through February 2025, and they were unanimously approved.

Membership recruitment (Nancy Barlow): Marketing expert Nancy Barlow presented components of her re-branding plan, including a vibrant new RMPL logo featuring the Library name with a date cancellation against a mountain background. She also presented examples of social media pages advertising the RMPL and CYPHER youth club.

Special Delivery of Dreams Scholarship Update (Regina Domenici): 842 college students applied for one of four \$2500 scholarships. Automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) (Regina Domenici): Ten attendees completed the CPR certification and First Aid training class on March 5, 2025. A future class will be scheduled for early summer.

New Business

The 2025 Volunteer Dinner (Paul Domenici): Arrangements are made for the 2025 Volunteer Dinner on December 7, 2025, at Maggiano's in Englewood. The dinner menu will be served from 12:00 PM to 3:00 PM to accommodate those who prefer driving in daylight hours.
